- Lane County Director Donovan Dumire introduced Paul Soloman who provided an update of the programs in Lane County and welcomed everyone to the meeting.

Eric Guyer - Introduction

- Requested introductions around the table.
- Eric gave an update on recent work involving legislature.
- Supporting the Actual Cost Study;
 - Short session message to be presented tomorrow;
 - Eric reported on the work Betsy Jones and Laura Smith provide for Community Justice.
- OACCD Director Meeting Structure in the future:
 - A segment of the meetings dedicated to trainings by DPSST to maintain certification;
 - CJC presentations on their studies and research;
 - Providing a discussion to reflect the research in the work being done.
 - Presentations on cutting edge work in Community Corrections around the state;
 - Eric requests presenters provide a simple breakdown on the subject matter including;
 - How it relates to the OARs, research, practice and real-world examples.
 - Case Management and Gender Responsive Approaches for today's presentation.
 - Peer delivered services – Multnomah meeting.
 - No topic for the January meeting in Marion County at DPSST;
 - Eric requested topics from others would like to hear more about in the future.
 - Structure for future OACCD meetings will be;
 - Day 1 will cover training, research, cutting edge practices, and other updates;

Eric discussed his conversation with CJC Director Schmidt about leading Community Corrections reform in Oregon

- What does EXIT have to say about Community Corrections Reform on a National level?
 - What is applicable to Oregon and how does it look?
 - Jeremiah Stromberg, Nick Crapser of Sponsors, Aja Stoner of Care Oregon, and Jay Scroggin from Multnomah County visiting Columbia University to hear about EXIT's national reform.
 - Keeping an open mind in regard to standard data, shared definitions, and the idea that reform is an investment in what is needed in our communities

 - Eric went over some of Oregon's practices and statistics:
 - 22% reduction of those on probation over the last decade;
 - Collaborative case planning;
 - 48% decrease in local control bed use between 2007-2019 (roughly 1100 beds vs. 578 beds);
 - Post Prison Supervision has remained flat;
 - Revocation as a source of prison intake has remained steady at 20.7%;
 - Earned discharge as the center of reform;
 - Eric presented Jeff Wood with a plaque for his work as OACCD president from 2017-2019.
 - Eric moved agenda items to the following day;
 - Approval of Amendments;
 - Potential contracting opportunities;
 - Betsy and Laura will go over a few talking points.

Tira Hubbard - Case Management Practices and Gender Responsive Strategies

- Oregon Case Management Network;
- History of Assessment and Case Management;
- OAR Case Management & Assessment Requirements;
 - PSC/Proxy – triage;
 - LS/CMI – Males – 8 domains;
 - WRNA - Females – 13+ domains.
- What goes into case planning?
 - Assessment;
 - Identifying Criminogenic Risk;
 - Identify the problem;
- What does it look like?
 - SMART goals
 - Identifying strengths and barriers
 - Targeted interventions

- Transitioning roles of the PPO;
 - Referee; No win/loss record;
 - End of a game- refs go home;
 - Look for infractions;
 - Blow your whistle on every infraction;
 - Follow the rule book;
 - Success is dependent on catching infractions.
- Coach
 - Keep track of wins and losses;
 - At the end of a game- coaches go celebrate wins with the team or learn from losses;
 - Have a relationship with players;
 - Has to bench players;
 - Must have people skills and desire to be experts in the game;
 - Help players learn from mistakes;
 - They have a playbook and they have players practice;
 - Are an authority figure but also part of the team;
 - Have to give players feedback.

- What are the fundamentals of Gender-Responsive?
 - Gender Responsive vs. Gender Specific;
 - Criminogenic Need;
 - Costs;
 - Strategies to implement.
- Pathway in and a Pathway out.
- Gender responsive cost savings occur when sanctions consider pathways;
 - Alternative interventions are used;
 - Targeted case plans for criminogenic needs;
 - Building self-efficacy;
 - Less jail units necessary resulting in cost savings.
- Additional Gender Responsive Cost Savings;

- Free strategies to implement Gender Responsive case planning/caseloads:
 - Move women to the same caseload (gender specific);
 - Use the WRNA;
 - Normative Feedback includes identifying the pathway into the system;
 - Create relational caseloads- females are relational and will have more successes on supervision when they have a “relationship” with their PO (mutual, empowering and empathetic);
 - PO communication style (identify boundaries, allow time to process verbally, be genuine, ask her permission, use strength-based language, use her name);
 - Positive Reinforcements; words, cards, collaborate with women’s groups for rewards;
 - Build Self- efficacy- teach new coping skills, empower decision making;
 - Trauma informed- learn about trauma (symptoms, indicators, grounding techniques);
 - Environment- lighting, color, noise;
 - Sanctions- view acts of non-compliance as coping/survival skills- use a trauma lens to create interruptions is harmful behavior.
- The “ASK” The “OFFER”:
 - OCMN asks that OACCD supports the development of the Gender Responsive Co-hort within the larger OCMN. Send people to OCMN;
 - Look at developing Gender Responsive Caseloads and strategies in your Department. We will help;
 - Utilize OCMN for: Consultation, Best Practices, Strategy development, Case Planning assistance, Training and Skill development;
 - Future plans: Develop a Gender Responsive Network similar to that of FVSN, OCMN and SOSN.

Case Management & Gender Responsive Q&A

- What should the caseload size be compared to a male caseload?
 - When moving women from a gender-neutral caseload to a gender responsive caseload, they are the same, it is the PO that is changing;
 - Women take more time because they are now being heard, collaboration is happening, more interest in their role as a mother;
 - Through WRNA, OMS, and gender responsive interventions the time will reduce over time;

- Jeff Hansen reported there has not been any research on caseload size, FSAPP caseloads were capped at 30;
- Tira reported 45 high risk females feels manageable when you are trained and you know what you are doing;
- Multnomah is using community health workers which has been beneficial;
- Collaboration with community partners is beneficial;
- Jeff Hansen reported they have seen a clear reduction in risk scores;
 - Women pool in the medium;
 - Medium 34-36 feel more like a high risk in the community;
 - Trauma added to risk and need feels like more risk;
- Jeff Hansen reported they are in the process of validating the data and using international cutoffs;
 - It is not known if they are accurate for Oregon.
 - The rollout for the WRNA has been much better than the rollout for the LS/CMI;
 - He also stated women are the primary caretakers of the next generation and to keep that in mind when results come out;
- Eric asked if the OACCD would like to formally recognize the OCMN add the development of the Gender Responsive co-hort, adding four (4) hours to the beginning of the OCMN meetings?
 - Donavon Dumire made a motion to approve:
 - The motion was seconded by Steve Berger; and
 - A voice vote was unanimous.

Betsy Jones & Laura Smith - Lobby Team Update

- Meeting on a regular basis with the Governor's Office and DOC;
- Community Corrections Budget solution
- Meeting with legislatures who have been sympathetic and supportive;
- Stakeholders meeting to be held in January;
 - Preparing a packet of information for the meeting including;
 - Understanding the cost study;
 - Foundation of the budget and how it works.
 - Sending out talking points to Directors to use with their legislatures;
 - They ask you to call your legislature and ask them to visit your facility;
 - Talk about what is going on in your county specifically;
 - Be prepared to talk about success stories;
 - They will help you to get through the talking points if needed.

- Betsy and Laura will reach out to Directors individually;
- January 13th-15th next legislative session.
- Short session is February 3rd and will meeting for 35 days;
 - Legislatures want to target the short session for the Community Corrections budget;
 - There has been talk that the Republicans may walk out again;
 - An emergency board can meet in the interim and provide some funds.
- Cost study rate focus of \$14.24 per day (\$2.17 per day more) is necessary to meet the level of services necessary;
 - If the increase happens would it be the new baseline?
 - It has nuances, and if done correctly it would be the new baseline.
 - Any adjustment applies to the biennium with nuances.

Eric Guyer - Executive Team

- Executive Team has the authority to approve a request of \$1,000 or less has ability to approve;
 - More funding than \$1,000 will require OACCD approval.
- Funding for a video surrounding the cost study;
 - Example on YouTube;
 - Theresa Mahoney;
 - Under five (5) minutes on the video would not exceed \$6,000;
 - The message would reflect the input of the OACCD.
- Steve Berger would support if there is a way to capture a simple message in a dynamic format that supports the cost study, helps understand the cost study, and is effective for the audience.
- Aaron Hartman stated it could be on the OACCD website.
- Eric entertained a motion:
 - Kevin Karvandi made a motion to approve;
 - Donavon Dumire seconded the motion;
 - A vote was requested, no one opposed.
- Ginger Martin brought on as a non-threatening personality to share the context and history of Community Corrections work;
 - Eric reported the OACCD would still keep the overall budget at the \$50,000 mark;
 - Currently there is \$134,000;
- Eric entertained a motion:
 - Dale Primmer made a motion to approve;
 - Malcolm McDonald seconded the motion,

Larry Evenson - CMA Enhancement Project: PowerPoint on OACCD website

- New profiles:
 - CMA reviewer – BCP - designation in county needed;
 - Coaching/feedback.

- CMA maintenance – Jeremiah.
- CMA reviewer caseload changes:
 - Snapshot to right;
 - Drop downs changed in position from left to right;
 - Option 24 ability now available;
 - UA, warrants, sanctions, assessments (Odara, static stable acute) still remain in green screen;
 - Addition of PSC, SONL, ODARA;
 - New tab added case plan section;
 - Consequences and reinforcers added;
 - Calendar addition – caseload or specific person – can email client from the calendar with the reminder of appointment. Works with outlook and Gmail.
 - Calendar allows you to see your week’s appointments.
- Treatment module wider now;
- Contact details;
 - Address, phone, email into OMS;
 - History of addresses, phone, email;
 - Homeless button to allow ability to track;
 - Homeless or transient report.
- Inmate Management Plan and Misconducts;
- Supervision fees can be viewed – current and expired;
- Conditions – general and special:
 - Link to action plan to add condition;
 - Print or email to them.
 - Behavior Change Plan:
 - Coaching component:
 - Random number of SIDs selected for review;

- County will determine the number you want reviewed each month;
- Feedback mechanism to PO and one on one meeting;
- PO can also provide feedback to the coach – anonymous;
- Two types of reports created:
 - General report PDF – BIRT report;
 - BIRT report – click on the specific bar in the report and it will create a PDF report showing the information specific to the report being run;
 - Significant contact report still not working.
- Admin Report:
 - Total BCPs created/scored;
 - State overview right side of the report;
 - Left bottom coaching feedback responses.
- CMA Rollout Training Plan Tentative go live date is January 16, 2020.
 - Train the Trainer:
 - December 10th at DPSST;
 - Requesting OCMN members to attend;
 - Overview of the technical changes;
 - Hands on, with the hopes to build a cadre to help with regional training, site location training and local support.
- Regional Training:
 - DPSST, Multnomah, Deschutes, Jackson, Clackamas, Washington & Umatilla;
 - 4 hours in duration, 4 sessions at each location over 2 days, 25 per session;
 - Tentative schedule of the Second, Third and fourth week of January (Dates TBD);
 - Laptops required with access to internet/Wi-Fi;
 - Technical hands on training covering the changes to the OMS system.

 - Creation of short duration instructional videos covering basic tasks;

Ken Sanchagrin, JD PhD – CJC Research Update – Long Term Recidivism Rates in Oregon

- Background:
 - CJC Semi-Annual Recidivism Reports;
 - Nine reports (seven long form and two short reports);

- DOC defined six-month cohorts;
- Standard Oregon recidivism definition is an arrest, conviction, or incarceration for a new crime within three years;
- Motivation for the current analysis:
 - Weakness of the CJC Semi-Annual Reports;
 - Unanswered questions;
 - What happens after three years? Are we missing important information?
- Prentky et al. (1997), Harris and Hanson (2004) report that some categories of offenders have their first recidivating event after three years on average;
- How do we define or identify when someone has desisted from crime?
 - Is Oregon underestimating recidivism?
 - What categories of offenders have slower or lower recidivism?
 - Is Oregon underestimating recidivism?
 - What categories of offenders have slower or lower recidivism?
- Analytical Approach:
 - Investigate extended follow-up periods for recidivism (1, 3, 5, 10, and 15-year recidivism rates);
 - Conduct a more rigorous Risk Analysis, examining who recidivates and when.
- Data:
 - Arrest History Score:
 - A sliding scale of arrest history, where more recent arrests are more heavily weighted compared to less recent arrests;
 - Arrests occurring more than 5 years before the recidivism start date are not included;
 - A maximum of one arrest per day is counted in the creation of this measure.
- Sample Demographics:
 - Majority white and male;
 - Average age of 33.15;
 - Almost half the sample are drug or property offenders;
 - Arrest history score ranges from 0-124 (average 7.98).

- Key Takeaways:
 - Long Term Recidivism;
 - 10-year expungement timeline may be cautious;
 - Within five years, between 80-90% of recidivism has happened;
 - For drug and property offenders, nearly 80% of recidivism has already occurred within just three years.

Dylan Arthur - Parole Board

- Introductions;
 - Greta Lowry
 - John Bailey
 - Patty Cress
- SONL Project Update;
 - 31,000 on registry
 - Adding 100 per month
 - Classified 5788
 - 25,000 not classified
 - Deadline has been moved to 12/31/2026
- Board Priorities;
 - Level from institution;
 - Individuals moving into the state within 90 days;
 - Approximately 650 individuals have a prior predatory designation that didn't qualify for auto Level 3;
 - Board has a place for someone to request relief or reclassification;
 - One week to two months to conduct assessments;
 - Objections can take up to five months.

- Asking for Community Corrections help Leveling the approximately 1,800 individuals who are the Boards responsibility, statutorily, to level that are currently on supervision;
 - Approximately 2,500 individuals on the registry who are currently supervised;
 - 700 are probation or local controls after 2014;
 - Closer to release to community is at higher risk;
 - A lot of the 1800 individuals are supervised for crimes other than a sex offense, they have not desisted from their antisocial thinking/behavior and are a potential risk.
- What would this look like?
 - Counties would gather the required documentation;
 - Score Static 99R and enter into DOC 400;
 - Include a substantiation;
 - Provide Board Notice of Rights;
 - Chrono the date NOR served;
 - Send Board an email with:
 - Name
 - SID
 - All documents used for scoring
 - County personnel who complete assessments must be Static 99R trained.
- Boards Responsibility:
 - Board will provide a list of names that need assessments;
 - Board will need county to determine who is county and Board responsibility.
 - Provide NOR to counties;
 - Complete final order and send to OSP;
 - Hearings Officer for Board would hear objections;
 - Board will save documents.

Malcolm McDonald – SOSN Update

- Josephine and Clackamas County volunteered to be pilot counties to determine amount of time necessary to support the Boards request.
- SOSN made recommendation to assist the Board with Leveling.
- Dylan stated approximately 10 out of 100 request relief and would require a Hearings Officer.
- Board has requested a review of OAR for historic registrants:
 - Auto level anyone in community for 10 or more years on sex offense;
 - No new person felony or misdemeanors;
 - Approximately 13,000 people.
- January SOSN training on the SONL process for Probation Officers.
- Two pilot counties will provide feedback to OACCD:
 - Vote to be done at a later date.

- Static Stable Acute Training needed email Malcolm.

Jeff Hanson – Department of Corrections

- Trying to be more proactive with CPCs;
 - Tracey Coffman is being trained to assist with CPCs;
 - Outcome issues due to the quality of the data in the treatment module;
 - Second CPCs have been conducted and programs are making progress.
- IRR LS/CMI coming in May;
 - Jeff asked group if it is time to take a break?
 - Should they focus on those that need more work?
 - Possible changes such as focusing on a domain?
 - Request counties communicate with the Probation Officers about accuracy of assessments and they can do overrides.
- WRNA IRR will be staggered.
- Jeff stated there was a passage in the LS/CMI report that stated Probation Officers manipulated scores.

Denise Sitler – Department of Corrections

- Approximately 60% of the M57 IGAs have been approved.
- Denise will look at CCA prior to submitting them;
 - No payments will be received until DOC receives them.
- Denise suggested a work group to discuss changes to the CCA forms;
 - Can't remove anything but they can be reviewed for changes;
 - Directors can send suggestions to Eric Guyer.
- Biennial close-out coming in December.
- Denise stated her reports will now include WRNA.
 - Contract out to validate WRNA.
- Denise asked if the counties still need the reports, do they have value, and/or do they need to be changed?
 - Dashboards will provide some of the information included in reports and may be redundant;
 - PCS Misdemeanor – update;
 - Six-month revocation report;
 - Abscond reports – Update;

- Non-funded population;
- CC report;
- LS/CMI & WRNA unclassified report;
- PSC proxy override report.
- Malcolm requested a monthly funded population report.

Judy Bell – New fee system update

- Requests involvement from counties with the new fee system;
- Emailed Directors with 4 decision points and survey monkey;
 - Provided a handout with definitions and decision points.
- Jodi asks if statements can be sent via email?
 - Judy is trying to confirm whether or not email is considered a valid written document;
 - If subject to Oregon Accounting Manual (OAM) snail mail will be required;
 - Are counties required to follow the OAM?
 - Jodi stated email tends to remain the same where addresses change often.
- FSN will be utilized as the work group for the fee system build.
- January 23, 2020 hosted by Marion County.

Denise Sitler – Urban Institute study of earned discharge

- Urban Institute would like to come out and do site visit;
 - Looking for volunteers;
 - Only 5% are showing as coming back onto supervision;
 - Possibly coming in January for site visits.
- Eric asked group to let him know if they are interested in volunteering.

Eric Guyer Update

- He reported there might be an uptick in the community surrounding the CJC recidivism study.
- Community Corrections Review process;
 - Many counties had concerns about the process;
 - Some counties were grateful for the CCR;
 - Requested counties provide him with input so they have a balanced approach to the next CCR.

Ian Davidson – Criminal Justice Commission

- Clarified the different recidivism reports;
 - Long Term Recidivism Report;
 - November Report – every six months.

- HB3064 2019 Session;
 - Creating a JRI advisory committee;
 - Convening in January and will run through September.

- LPSCC Survey sent to primary contacts;
 - Collaborate with Commissioners or courts;
 - Small changes to the survey;
 - Required by statute.
 - Specialty Courts;
 - Implementation funding went to grant review committee last week and will be presented to the board on December 4th;
 - Around \$2,000,000, however, total ask was less;
 - Will likely be supplemental round in June or July.
 - Changes in Staff;
 - Karen Kann will be joining CJC during the first of December.
 - Executive Assistant position is open;
 - Research Analyst position open specifically focusing on bias crimes.

Chris Enquist – DPSST Update – Handout Provided

Wendi Jackson – Dashboards – Handout updated IGAs

- IGA Amendments;
 - Provides more protection;
 - March Multnomah county agenda for OACCD.

Jodi Merritt – FAUG Update – Handout Provided

- Update to the closure codes:
 - Administrative closure;
 - Intended to reflect the offender is not being held responsible for not completing the treatment requirements, nor would the provider.
 - Successful treatment closure;
 - Evaluation – no treatment recommended – closure date?
 - Verification from provider required.
 - Unsuccessful closure.
- Treatment module needs further discussion;
 - Possibly move to the case management section?
 - Request that counties discontinue the evaluation only entry;
 - Donovan volunteered for the treatment module work group.
- FAUG committee would like a definition of *Significant Contact* and a work group surrounding this issue.
 - Denise reflected on the previous OACCD meeting to remove the *Significant Contact* and make it simply *Contact*.
 - Denise and Jay are on this work group.

Mental Health Supervision Network – No Update

Jessica Beach – Pretrial Justice Network Update

- Presentation from Connect Tech similar to AutoMon.
