MAT IN THE DOC

Ann Chakwin, PhD – Department of Corrections – Health Promotion Programs Coordinator

Review why medication is used for addiction tx;

Decreases cravings

Increases the likelihood of other interventions success

Antagonist – Vivitrol – binds to receptors –

Peer Recovery Pilot project: Reshape social and cultural setting; 16 peers in 3 prisons; mentees are leaving prison returning to county to work with peers;

3 tier intervention; trained as CRMs to incarcerated adults; males/females

Chose through staff; interviewed; assessment at intake; match them with mentors; mentees get addiction related case management to prepare them for return to county.

Donnell Meyer DOC

Lack of MAT for women; OHSU ROAR program; started in July;

Vivitrol injection; first shot is free; connected to Bridgeway or Coda; injection given 5-7 days prior to release; OHSU follows up for 6 months; 1 individual has met the 6 month timeline; pairing with CRM who does reach in prior to release. Project ends the end of this year; total of 100 participants; data rec'd from OHSU will be beneficial.

Statewide approach to MAT: Continuation on MAT when they are already on MAT; Releasing – determining plan to give them Vivitrol; Deciding medication primary will Buprenorphine; for releasing how will they connect them in the community to continue shots. 13 months or less will stay on MAT; more than 13 months will stay on medication for 6 months and then taper.

Complications: finding a prescriber; prescriber load of patients varies depending on the length of time they have been licensed; sublingual -20 minutes and regular urinalysis testing.

Chris Enquist – Mental Health and Use of Force

Policy; Governmental Interest = Graham Factors.

- *Severity of Crime; Immediate threat to officer or others; Subject actively resisting arrest; Subject evading arrest by flight or seizure; Totality of the circumstances; Rapidly evolving situation.*

Interactions with Disturbed or Distraught Persons:

LE encounter with disturbed or distraught person conduct risk assessment;

- Ask questions;
- Is there a weapon?
- What kind of weapon?

- Who is in danger?
- Are they confined?
 - Problematic answers – use reasonable force to stop the threat.
 - No risk – stop and engage CIT protocols.

Whether it was known or should have been known to the officers that a suspect was emotionally disturbed or mentally distraught. Case law surrounding this.

ACTIVITY: PPO contacting a person and what changes between the following examples: (known mental illness)

- Warrant in the lobby;
- Random Encounter;
- HV at group home;
- Planned field arrest.

Data from CJC on FSAPP:

3yr. mark 17% lower rate recidivism than non-participating parent – parents perfectly matched to those who did not participate.

DOC plans to present the data to legislature during the short session. 1 or 2 fsapp counties present about their program. CBA through CJC.

Earned discharge study – Urban institute – Ore. Chosen to be studied. No other state gave authority to PP and DOC. No other state funded cases once they were off. No uniform structure between counties, each county decides their substantial compliance. 17% in Lincoln Co. statewide average 7%. Those that had Eligible sentences. DOC concerns led to this study – concerns the program funding would be lost. Finalize study in late spring. May have results at May OACCD. Study will be based on Mult. And Wash. County, however, if other counties have unique issues or procedures contact DOC.

Eric response: 17:40

DOC – semiannual review. Cost study and Jackson County Fire Crews drew the most questions and attention.

Budget Update DOC: 25M – staffing %'s data – 4 counties did not respond which was only 2% of overall population.

Average and weighted average: More favorable/reflective was weighted, 68% to personnel costs for the state. Capitated rate increases each biennium. DOC uses previous biennium and adds inflation rate of approximately 3-3.5%. Personnel costs were 12% this last biennium. Increases in personnel, programs, supervision, 50M gap. Looking at ways to reduce the gap. DOC uses exception inflation, need a higher rate of inflation % due personnel costs – used one time to meet those personnel inflation rates.

300M GIA: apply 3% to 100M: apply 12% to 200M: would provide additional money toward personnel costs. This is a process DOC is familiar with, utilize it for the Health Care costs. DOC hoping to use this in the future for community corrections. 21-23 biennium. 12% was 17-19 compared to 19-21. Will need Governor office to approve the actual percentage?

Jay asked if DOC could ask for the exception rate during state hiring and inflation freezes?

Director Peters talking to Sheriffs – inmate vs. adult in custody; work crew no longer in DOC labeled clothing: Van will still be labeled and signs up.

Larry Evenson – 40:20

Continue to offer counties to meet with team and would like a small work group together. Business Analyst position \$100K offered from OACCD: No interest was found through base camp recruiting tool. Trying to find a way to fill the roll, Wende Jackson from Multnomah may take on the roll, interview upcoming to determine. 4-6 month position. IGAs extended indefinitely.

Denise –biennial plan work group –

Judy Bell 48:00 Super Users and may want a group for the new fee system. Counties need to clean up their fee data prior to utilizing new program. Jan 29th presentation

Lindsay DPSST 50:00 – FLYER PROVIDED

Professional Standards division: Certification and Training: Armed officers must attend board approved fire arms training. Rule will be sent out – Agency must inform DPSST if they intend to arm officers, Officer must complete training within 18 months. Looking at May 1st implementation. What is DPSSTs role in background investigations? Workgroup made recommendations to create a depository data base, which will show if someone has interviewed with other agencies, will only show name of applicant and where they interviewed. No ETA on this. How are professional standard reviews being conducted with those who may have a crime on their record. DPSST would be able to inform agencies if applicant can be hired – will be done much quicker. ETA September. Anyone who applies would be required to register through DPSST prior to interview.

Moral fitness standards workgroup –Leave profession but are not de-certified – proposed rule is removing from certification after 5 years, they will be expired. ETA February.

Workgroup pre-employment medical standards and DPSST pre-physical standards.

Chris PP – two scheduled, 2 week trainings covering all disciplines with breakout curriculum for each discipline. 1:08

Dylan – moving forward with Josephine county on leveling (5 done already). Board voting on new rule regarding auto level process, 10 or more years crime free person felony & person misdemeanor. Research shows female tend to be low risk – provided no child abuse or compelling and promoting – can be auto leveled to 1, if passed during the vote. OACCD and SOSN will be notified.
