### **A Call to Invest \$25.6 million into Community Corrections**

The Oregon Association of Community Corrections Directors is asking for \$25.6 million dollars to be invested in Grant in Aid to Community Corrections. These dollars represent an accounting for the actual cost of serving justice-involved individuals equitably and with approaches that lead to lasting behavior change.

1. \$25.6 million means counties can do the assessment, case planning and behavioral interventions that we know lead to better outcomes and long term pro-social change.
2. \$25.6 million creates housing, treatment and peer-delivered supports tailored to the needs of justice-involved individuals.
3. \$25.6 million closes the gap between proposed funding and the actual cost of providing services. This amount represents the bi-partisan work that was done in the 2020 legislative short session to provide funding for Community Corrections.
4. As we look at right-sizing the population of justice-involved individuals and decreasing the use of prison, it is incumbent upon community corrections to utilize those approaches most likely to create enhanced safety and stabilization in the lives of those who are served.
5. An adequately funded Community Corrections is the foundation for a successful JRI program.
6. This funding does not increase the footprint of community corrections, rather it financially supports quality interventions in line with human-centered reform efforts.

### **Working Toward a Solution**

Oregon Community Corrections Directors' Association and Oregon State Sheriff's Association ask that you advocate for infusing \$25.6 million for Community Corrections in order to continue the powerful and transformative work that has resulted from this partnership.
